

In Christ,

We live in a consumer culture. One of the byproducts of a consumer culture is that if there is a demand for anything, there can be made a market for it. This is potentially dangerous because there is always a demand for even sinful things. Furthermore, there is a danger because the human person's misdirected and sinful desires are insatiable. No amount of a certain thing is necessarily going to satisfy indefinitely, as long as there is still more to be consumed. One of the ways the market has taken advantage of this flaw of human nature is by constantly producing upgrades and newer, better models of their product. This has played a large part in turning our society into a throwaway and over indulgent culture.

The consumer mentality has had another less obvious but terrible effect on some Christians and Catholics. We have been so formed to be consumers that we are even consumers in the practice of our religion. The *consumer Catholic* approaches the faith as if it were something that ought to serve us, rather than the practice of faith and religion being our service to God. This has become all the more evident in relation to Mass. There seems to be some notion that the Mass ought to be offered in such a way that people in the pews are treated like paying customers – patrons of a business. If the Mass fails to entertain or has some flaw from the point of view of the customer then it must be fixed. The customer is always right, after all.

Every priest I know, including myself, has had someone threaten to leave a parish, find another place to go to church, if some problem is not fixed. I call this the "I'll take my business elsewhere" threat. Usually these threats aren't for something legitimate, like heretical preaching, or irreverent and illicit ways of offering the Mass. Usually it is something more like not being able to hear or understand clearly every word spoken, or when they don't like the music, or when it is not a perfect temperature to suit them, or when the Mass or preaching is boring or too long, or ever worse, the priest actually tries to offer the Mass in a reverent way according to the rubrics established by the Church rather than a flamboyant and comical way.

In general the consumer Catholic's complaints are based on their perception of not getting their money's worth, rather than concern that God is not getting His due. There is a prideful delusion among some who

think that the priest's primary concern ought to be their presence and money – like a restaurant needing customers. This self-entitled consumer attitude is deadly to a person's soul. It lacks humility, gratitude, and a proper sense of worship of God. This consumer sentiment coupled the pragmatism of our time, and the trend since the 1970's to make the Mass more about the people by dumbing down liturgical tradition has helped deform some Catholics into ungracious and disrespectful philistines (i.e. a person who is hostile or indifferent to culture and the arts, or who has no understanding of them).

It is right and appropriate for Catholics to *respectfully* convey concerns to their priest. This way he can correct the issue if possible, or correct the person if necessary. For Catholics to ungraciously threaten to leave, to "take my business elsewhere," is not Christian and does more damage to the soul of that person than it does to the priest or parish church.

Everything that we do, both in the market and in church, ought to be directed towards the greater glory of God – not merely satisfying some human need or desire. Anytime we become exclusively consumers we fall short of being disciples of Jesus Christ, who emptied and humbled himself by taking on human nature, even human death on a cross (cf. Phil 2).
